### FOREWORD

2024 has been a year of significant progress for UNFPA in the GCC region, notably through our leadership in several high-level regional and national forums and summits, and the implementation of enhanced innovative partnership approaches towards UNFPA's Strategic Plan.

The UNFPA's Strategic Plan aims to ensure that no one is left behind. It calls for the protection and promotion of human rights for all, especially the most vulnerable, with a view to further synergistically reducing preventable maternal mortality, unmet need for family planning and gender-based violence.

A strengthened partnership with the GCC countries, starting with the Sultanate of Oman as the host country of the UNFPA Office since 2006, is key to accelerating the implementation of the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD) Programme of Action and achieving universal access to sexual and reproductive health and rights for all.

In line with UNFPA's Strategic Plan, the Office has invested in population data and analysis to better inform and contribute to the development of social policies that are evidence-based, with rights-based and gender transformative approaches to accelerate progress and ensure that no one is left behind.

In 2024, a series of *«Jalsat Shabab»* gatherings were launched, embodying the principle of *«for the youth, by the youth.»* Facilitated by young people, with support from UNFPA and GCC government entities in charge of youth affairs,

these gatherings provided a platform for young people to exchange knowledge, discuss challenges, and collaboratively develop solutionoriented suggestions addressing issues aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

This initiative aimed to foster increased youth participation, moving beyond general vision implementation to focused, youth-driven action.\*

In 2024, UNFPA worked towards a strengthened interagency partnership, contributing firstly to the development of the UN Cooperation Frameworks in Bahrain and Kuwait and the implementation of the UN Cooperation Framework in Saudi Arabia, and secondly to the strengthening of relations and joint activities with UN agencies present in Oman, Qatar and the United Arab Emirates.

The 2024 Annual Report presents the main results and impacts of activities carried out with our partners in the 6 GCC countries covered by the UNFPA Office.

As we celebrate our achievements, we recognise that there is much more to be done. The unfinished business is a call to step up our efforts and investments through strengthened partnerships to ensure that every person in the GCC region can exercise their rights and fulfill their potential, accelerating the path towards achieving the Sustainable Development Goals in each and every GCC country.

In the GCC, UNFPA collaborates with the 6 member states and the Gulf Cooperation Council to improve the well-being of all people, particularly women, adolescents, youth, older persons, and marginalized groups in a high-income development setting.

UNFPA offers policy advice and technical support in demographic intelligence, population and development, gender equality, and reproductive, maternal, and adolescent health to support evidence-based policies and informed decisions. This includes building institutional capacity in data analysis and revising national documents such as ministerial strategies and reports like Voluntary National Reports and Human Rights Reports.



#### What We Did

Partnered with the Muscat Stock Exchange in Oman to launch the «Ring the Bell» initiative on International Women's Day. This high-profile event provided a platform for women leaders to share their experiences and advocate for increased investment in women.

#### **Impact**



The «Ring the Bell» initiative significant generated media coverage, raising awareness about women's economic empowerment and sparking conversations about gender equality.

Collaborated with the Ministry of Social Development and Academia (Nizwa and Sohar Universities) to organize interactive dialogues in Universities during the 16 Days of Activism campaign.



The 16 Days of Activism campaign successfully reached a wide audience, generating significant media attention and fostering collaboration among stakeholders. These efforts highlighted the importance and need to bolster initiaives in raising awareness on the safeguards in place as well as the role of community based approaches to tackle the issue.







UNFPA works on enhancing GCC youth engagement and participation in decision-making and leadership.

#### What is at stake

Young people in the GCC, representing a significant portion of the population, are vital to the region's future. However, they often lack sufficient platforms to voice their opinions and contribute to decision-making processes and develop soft / life skills.

#### What We Did

Shabab» initiative, a series of youth gatherings held across Oman, Bahrain, UAE, and Qatar, served as the primary means to foster dialogue among young people, enabling them to share their perspectives and link their priorities with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and national visions, alongside UNFPA's support for developing youthled organizations through leadership and advocacy training.

#### Impact



**«Jalsat Shabab»** has successfully empowered youth by giving them more opportunity to express their voices, develop leadership skills, and actively contribute to shaping their future. The gatherings have led to the launch of several youth-led initiatives focused on addressing critical social issues, demonstrating the tangible impact of youth engagement.

## Reproductive Health and Rights

UNFPA works to address reproductive health non-communicable diseases, focusing on cervical cancer in Oman.

#### What is at stake

**Cervical cancer** presents a public health challenge in the GCC and beyond, with significant implications for women's health and well-being. In Oman, the national HPV vaccination program was initiated following advocacy and technical support efforts provided by UNFPA, helping to address a previously unprotected population.


#### What We Did

In close collaboration with the Ministry of Health in Oman, UNFPA supported a comprehensive Cervical Cancer Study to build a strong evidence base for advocating the inclusion of HPV vaccination in the national immunization program by creating an enabling environment through highlevel advocacy, providing technical input, engaging with the technical team on the study's outline and verification, and ensuring a scientifically rigorous approach aligned with international standards.

#### **Impact**



While the national vaccine rollout is in progress, substantial strides have been made. The Cervical Cancer Study has provided critical data for policy advocacy, and the Ministry of Health is now better equipped to implement a successful HPV vaccination program. This program has garnered national attention, and the groundwork has been laid for a national vaccination program.



### Data for Informed Policies

UNFPA works on strengthening the capacity to generate and utilize data to inform policies and effective programming and services. In 2024 the focus was on older persons. This involved developing elderly country profiles to analyze the situation of older persons and co-organizing events to promote data-driven planning and knowledge exchange.

#### What is at stake

The GCC region needs robust data to address the needs of older persons and ensure their inclusion.

#### What We Did

Developed elderly country profiles of Bahrain and Oman, analyzing policies, laws, programs, services, and data for older populations.

#### Impact



The profiles provided evidence-based insights to guide policies for older persons in Oman and Bahrain, highlighting the gaps in social inclusion, health, etc.

Co-organized a side event at the GCC data forum in Sharjah in partnership with GCCSTAT on the role of data in shaping effective programs and services for older persons.



The side event at the GCC data forum reinforced the importance of data-driven planning and programming for older persons and facilitated learning through GCC cross-border knowledge exchange.







UNFPA supports efforts to strengthen services for survivors of violence against women and girls (VAWG).


#### What is at stake

Lack of awareness, current social norms that contribute to exacerbate genderbased violence (GBV), and low level of coordination mechanisms among services in the region.

#### What We Did

UNFPA supported **Shamsaha**, a Bahraini NGO, in developing and launching a mobile application to improve coordination and access to support services for survivors of violence against women and girls in the Middle East.

#### Impact



Shamsaha The updated launched in March 2024, has achieved over 120,000 downloads demonstrating its reach and potential to empower survivors by providing a secure platform for information, support, and reporting.










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### Population Dynamics and Data



UNFPA provides strategic advice and technical assistance to national offices statistical enhance to institutional capacity for data collection and analysis in population data, statistics, and for the use of demanding precise and timely data for Al in censuses. This involves active participation and co-organization of national, regional, and international platforms to share expertise and foster collaborative data initiatives.

#### What is at stake

The GCC region is experiencing rapid demographic shifts, including an aging population and increasing diversity, effective policy formulation.

#### What We Did

Elderly country profiles were developed for Bahrain and Oman in partnership with HelpAge International, offering an analysis of the existing policies, laws, programs, services, and data for their older populations. Furthermore, a side event was coorganized with GCCSTAT at the GCC data and community development forum in Sharjah to discuss the role of data in shaping effective programs and services for older persons. Governmental data sources across the GCC region were leveraged to support efforts that reflect the goals of the ICPD within the broader framework of the sustainable development goals.

#### Lessons learned



Contributed to enhancing the region's capacity for evidence-based policy making. The data collection and analysis initiatives have improved the quality and availability of demographic data, while the reports on older persons have provided actionable insights for policy development. By supporting the development of programs and policies that address the specific needs of marginalized groups, we have contributed to a more inclusive and equitable society.



This data-driven approach enabled the creation of a dynamic tracking tool that not only monitors the progress of each GCC country against ICPD





#### What We Did

- UNFPA engaged in and co-organized events providing platforms for governments to share expertise on data including the 5<sup>th</sup> Arab High-Level Conference on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, the Sharjah (UAE) GCC Data and Social Development Forum, the Qatar National Population Day where UNFPA delivered the keynote address, and the Doha Data Forum where UNFPA facilitated a panel discussion and contributed to knowledge management through North-South Cooperation, inviting the Statistics Team from Moldova to present their EU experience related to Al and Census Analysis.
- UNFPA also presented the developed GCC country profiles at the Beijing+30 regional review and facilitated substantive sessions in the high-level review meeting of the Arab States Older Persons Strategy.


